Belgium signs the Berlin Declaration on Open Access to Knowledge in the Sciences and Humanities.

What?

A national conference on the advantages of Open Access for scholarly communication, with contributions by international experts in different disciplines. The Berlin Declaration will be signed by at least 6 rectors (cfr. programme)

Who?

This day is meant for all researchers, research administrators as well as members of institutional administrations and funding agencies. The day is organised by DRIVER, a project funded by the European Commission for the advancement of the visibility and accessibility of European research, in collaboration with the FWO, FNRS and many other Belgian research and academic institutions.

Why?

To demonstrate that Open Access can improve impact and visibility of research, and that Open Access should be used for research assessments. By signing the Berlin Declaration, research councils, politicians and rectors approve of this new paradigm in scientific communication.

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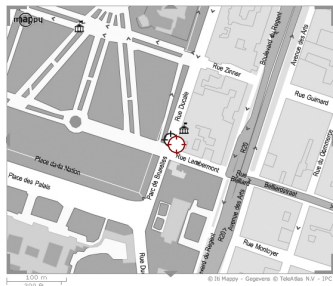
